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### Weekly Market Performance Summary- Week ending 24<sup>th</sup> April 2026

*As silent as it may seem, you can hardly miss the rising hum of uncertainty across the globe. The Middle East conflict is steadily reshaping market dynamics, and the implications are even more pronounced for economies already grappling with domestic vulnerabilities that risk snowballing into larger challenges.*

*In Kenya, that pressure point remains mounting spending needs, which are increasingly tilting the trajectory toward higher interest rates. With inflationary pressures expected to build, and a likely upward revision of benchmark rates should the conflict persist, investors will inevitably demand higher compensation, and not without justification. On the other side, the government's room to push back against costly bids continues to narrow, especially as expenditure demands keep rising.*

*That said, we are of the view that the window to meet the revised borrowing targets is rapidly closing, with only two months left in the fiscal year. May redemptions are notably elevated, and therein lies a window for the government to sneak in an infrastructure bond. Otherwise, the fiscal year could close with a meaningful portion of planned expenditure left unfulfilled.*

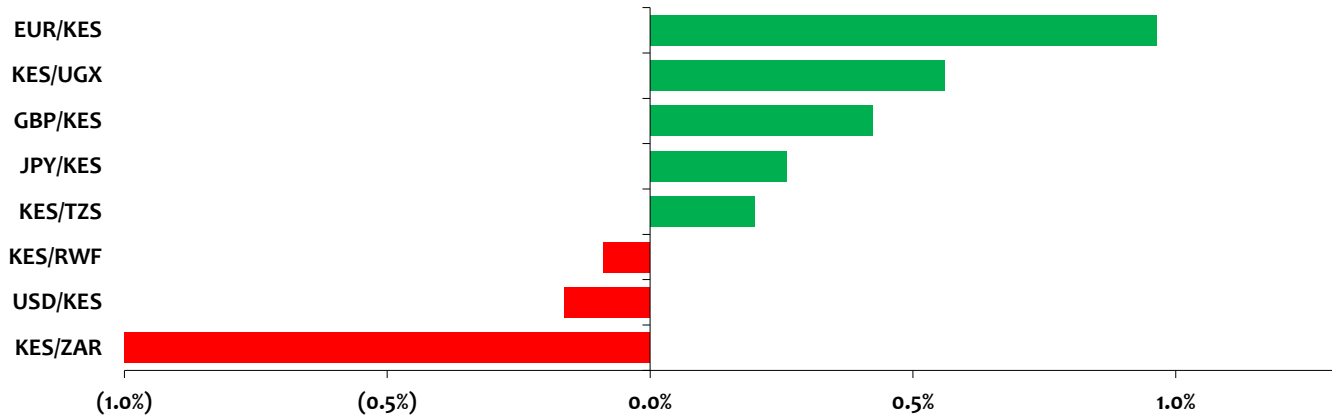

The Kenyan Shilling posted mixed performance last week, losing the most against the South African Rand and gaining the most against the Euro. See the visual below:

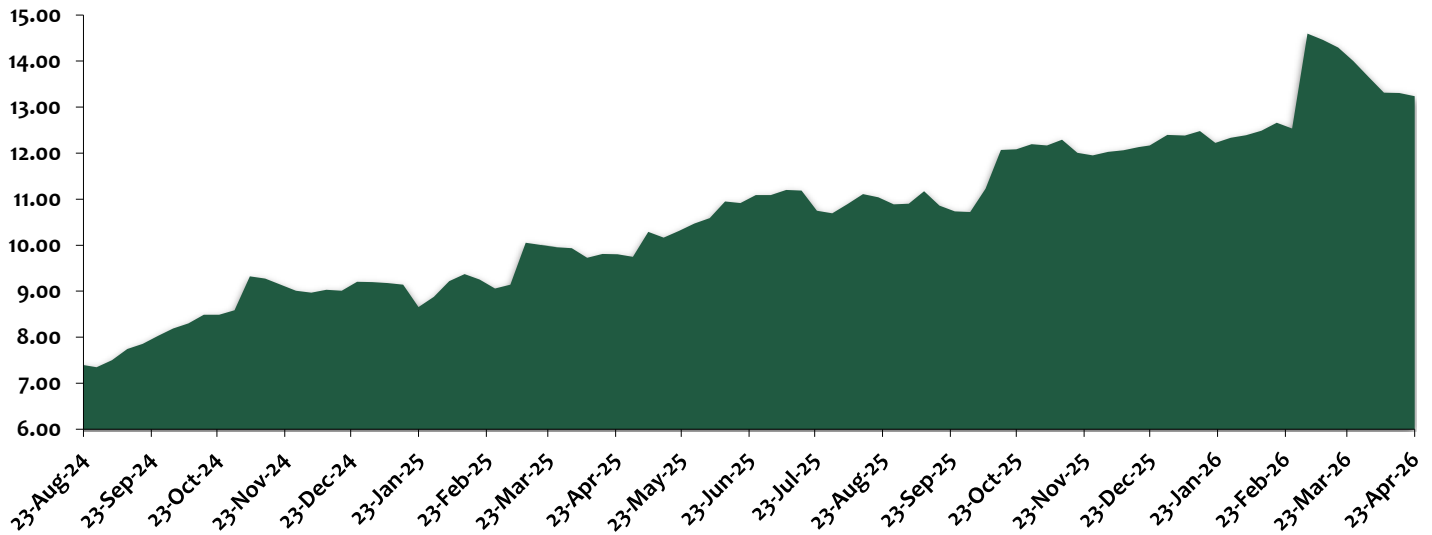
### W/W KES Performance

## FIXED INCOME PULSE

### Primary Market Activity:

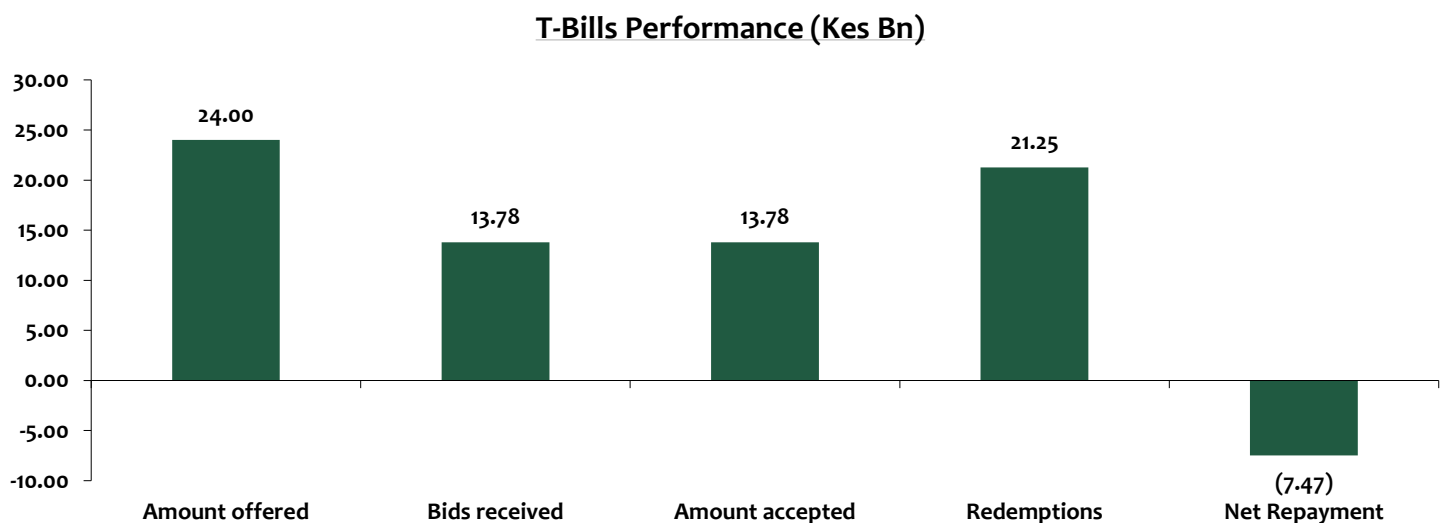
Demand for Treasury bills remained soft during the week, with the auction recording an undersubscription of 57.4%, down from 58.3% the previous week.

The 91-day paper did the heavy lifting, recording an oversubscription of 230.9%, a clear indication of increased aversion to duration risk. The Central Bank of Kenya received bids worth Kes 13.78Bn against an offer size of Kes 24.00Bn and accepted all of them, resulting in a net repayment position of Kes 7.47Bn after accounting for maturities worth Kes 21.25Bn.

Yields on the short-term papers edged upwards, particularly on the 91-day paper, signalling a cautious outlook and a growing demand for compensation. The 91-day and 182-day papers rose by 35.53bps and 5.72bps to 7.779% and 7.887%, respectively, while the 364-day paper dipped marginally by 0.13bps to 8.271%.

In the same week, liquidity conditions remained ample, with average interbank volumes improving slightly to Kes 8.30Bn from Kes 8.14Bn the previous week. Interbank rates, however, held steady at 8.76%.

### Treasury Bonds

The Central Bank of Kenya is in the market seeking to raise Kes 80.0Bn through the reopening of FXD1/2012/20, FXD1/2019/20, and FXD1/2021/25, with effective tenors of 6.5, 12.9, and 20.0 years, respectively. The reopening presents an opportunity for medium- to long-term investors seeking predictable returns across the curve.

The details of the bonds are outlined below. We will provide bidding estimates in due course:

The fiscal agent is also looking to switch Kes 10.0Bn of FXD1/2017/10 (Coupon rate of 12.97%) maturing in July 2027 with FXD1/2021/20 (Coupon of 13.44%) maturing in July 2041.

### Secondary Market

Secondary bond market activity rebounded during the week, with turnover surging by 51.9% to KES 61.77Bn from KES 40.67Bn the previous week, in tandem with a 13.1% increase in the number of deals.

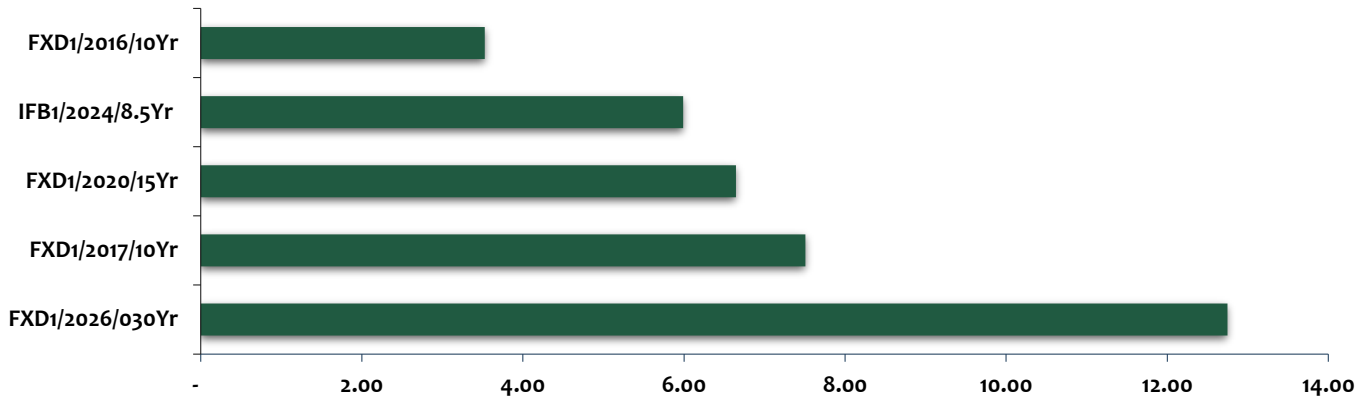

### Most Traded Bonds (Kes Bn)



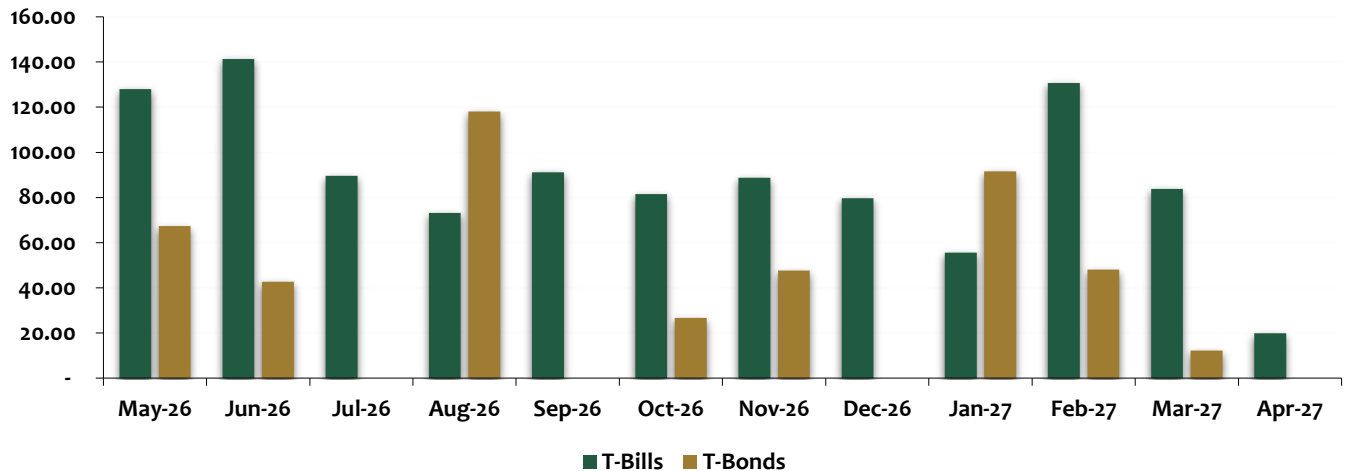

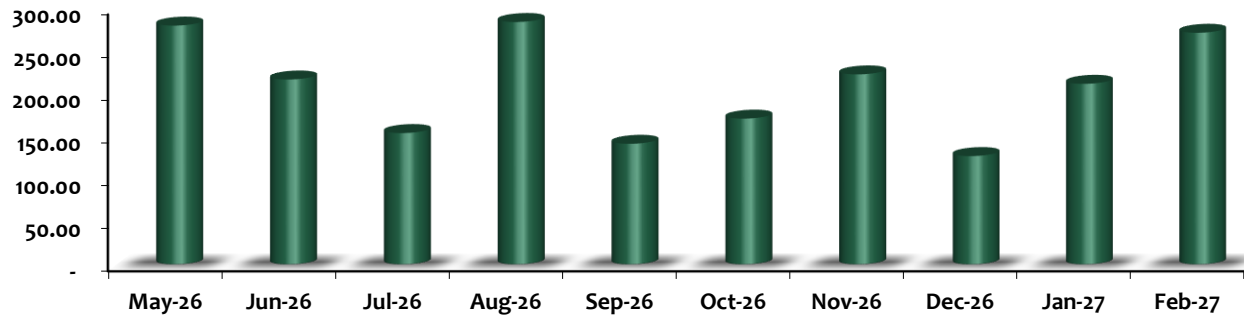
### T-Bill vs. T-Bond Maturities (Kes. Bn)

**Debt Service Obligations (Kes Bn)**

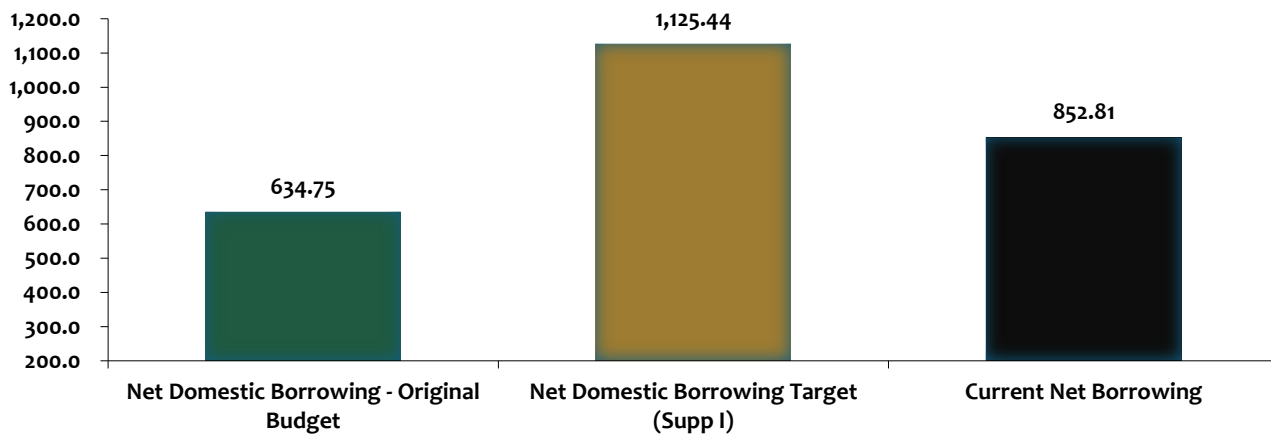

### Government Borrowing Position:

As of this week, the government’s net domestic borrowing stands at Kes 852.81Bn, equivalent to 75.8% of the FY2025/26 revised target. This lags the pro-rated target of Kes 995.58Bn. See the visual below:

**ACTUAL DOMESTIC BORROWING VS. TARGET**



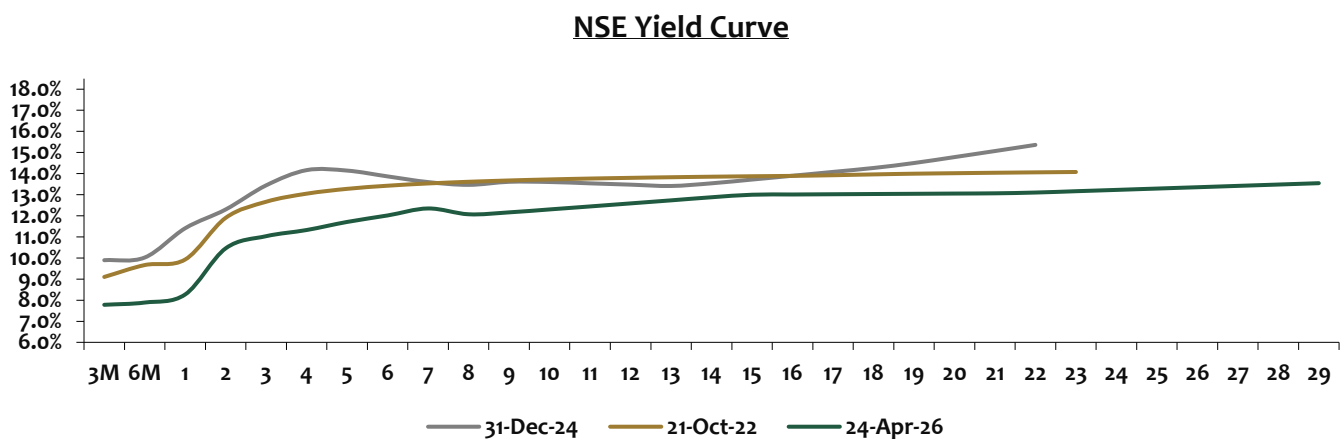

From the look of things, the government may struggle to meet its revised net domestic borrowing target, particularly in light of the heavy maturities falling due in May and June.

To stay on course, it would need to raise approximately Kes 272.64Bn, an outcome that appears increasingly unlikely under current market conditions, unless an infrastructure bond is introduced. In that context, there is a growing likelihood that the Government of Kenya may opt to float an infrastructure bond toward the close of the fiscal year to bridge the gap and support target expenditure.

## Local & International Yields

The local yield curve nudged lower but continued to send mixed signals, with the front end recording declines while the longer end edged upwards. That said, select long-dated papers also posted declines, pointing to pockets of demand even at the far end of the curve. The chart below compares the current yield levels with previous records:



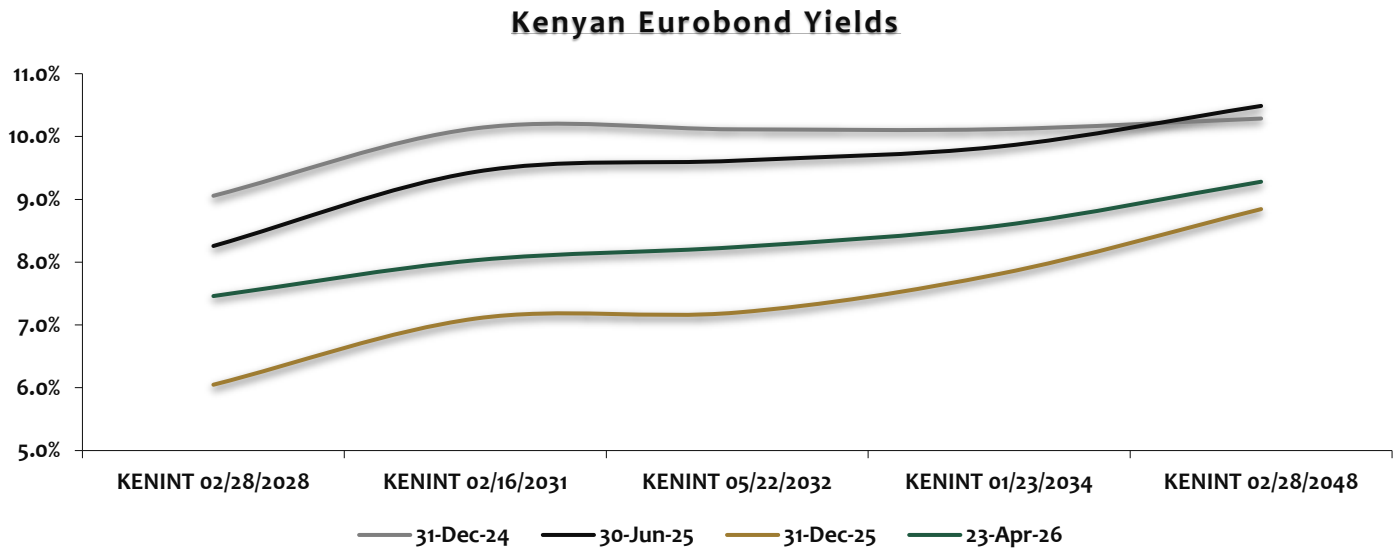

It is important to note that we remain wary of a potential upward trajectory, driven by rising inflationary pressures and elevated borrowing needs, as highlighted above. Should inflation compel the Central Bank of Kenya to tighten the benchmark rate, there is a strong likelihood that yields on government securities will edge higher—though we do not expect the overall curve to breach the 15% mark.

On the short end, yields are likely to adjust more rapidly, reflecting their sensitivity to policy shifts. However, in our view, they are unlikely to exceed 10% in the first half.

Meanwhile, Kenyan Eurobond yields posted mixed performance but remained broadly on an upward trajectory, reflecting persistent uncertainty in the global environment. The curve continues to drift further away from its start-of-year levels, signaling a clear repricing of risk and weakening investor sentiment.

We expect international rates to remain volatile in response to unfolding global developments, with a bias toward further increases in the near term.

### EQUITIES PULSE

**Market Indicators:** The equities market closed the week on a bullish note, with gains recorded across all major indices. NASI advanced 0.54% to 208.13, while NSE 10, NSE 20, and NSE 25 rose by 0.08%, 0.45%, and 0.25% to 2,172.43, 3,606.52, and 5,756.90, respectively. The Banking Index gained 0.95% to 241.14, reflecting sustained buying interest in banking counters.

Market capitalization increased 0.54% to Kes. 3,451.45Bn. Trading activity slowed significantly, with total equity turnover dropping 43.73% to Kes. 2,996.98Bn from Kes. 5,325.92Bn recorded over the previous week.

**Gainers/Losers:** Eaagads led the gainers' chart, advancing 9.50%, followed by BOC Kenya (+8.94%) and Standard Group (+5.37%). On the downside, Kenya Pipeline Co. topped the losers' list, shedding 6.84%, followed by Sameer Africa (-6.82%) and TPS Eastern Africa (-6.31%).

**Top Movers:** Safaricom dominated trading activity with Kes. 1,471.75Mn in turnover, followed by KCB Group at Kes. 301.67Mn and Equity Group at Kes. 275.05Mn, underscoring continued interest in large-cap counters.

**Foreign Participation:** Foreign investors remained net sellers during the week. Net inflows were recorded in KCB Group (Kes. 40.79Mn), KenGen (Kes. 9.62Mn), and NCBA Group (Kes. 7.85Mn). Outflows were more pronounced, led by Safaricom (Kes. -136.19Mn), Equity Group (Kes. -115.50Mn), and ABSA Bank Kenya (Kes. -73.14Mn), indicating sustained foreign exit from key blue-chip stocks.

## CORPORATE HIGHLIGHTS

Corporate activity during the week was highlighted by Co-operative Bank's proposed restructuring, Sanlam Allianz's return to profitability, and continued earnings pressure at WPP Scangroup.

**Co-operative Bank of Kenya** announced plans to restructure into a non-operating holding company (NOHC), transitioning the listed entity into Co-opbank Group PLC while a new subsidiary takes over core banking operations. The move is aimed at enhancing operational efficiency, strengthening the Group structure, and supporting long-term growth, subject to regulatory and shareholder approvals.

**Sanlam Allianz Holdings (Kenya) PLC** delivered a strong turnaround in FY2025, with insurance service results rising 45.7% to Kes. 951.50Mn and profit from continuing operations increasing 2.4% to Kes. 838.00Mn, reflecting improved core business performance. However, profit before tax declined 7.6% YoY to Kes. 1.32Bn due to normalized investment income, while the group returned to profitability at the PAT level, marking a recovery from prior losses following successful restructuring and capital strengthening initiatives.

**WPP Scangroup** reported a challenging FY2025 performance, with net loss widening 40.8% YoY to Kes. 713.67Mn amid a 16.3% decline in revenue to Kes. 2.04Bn following major client losses and restructuring costs. The deterioration at both PBT and PAT levels underscores ongoing operational pressures, with no dividend declared for the second consecutive year as the group focuses on stabilizing operations and rebuilding its client base.

### GLOBAL MARKET HIGHLIGHTS

**Global Inflation and Monetary Policy:** Global inflation pressures remained elevated during the week ending April 23, 2026, largely driven by sustained increases in global energy prices amid the ongoing US–Israel–Iran conflict. In the UK, headline inflation rose to 3.3% in March 2026 from 3.0% a year earlier, while Canada’s inflation climbed to 2.4% from 1.8%, reflecting higher utility costs, food prices, and transport expenses linked to persistent energy-driven cost pressures. The U.S. Dollar Index strengthened by 0.6% over the week, supported by renewed safe-haven demand.

Market Sentiment remains Cautiously risk-off, as elevated inflation and geopolitical tensions continue to shape a defensive investor outlook.

**International oil prices** trended upward during the week ending April 23, 2026, driven by escalating U.S.–Israel–Iran tensions that heightened concerns over potential supply disruptions. Murban crude rose to USD 92.38 per barrel on April 23 from USD 89.61 per barrel on April 16, reflecting increased risk premiums in the market amid constrained shipping routes and ongoing geopolitical uncertainty. Broader market data also indicates sustained bullish momentum in global crude benchmarks, supported by tightening supply conditions and strong demand signals.

Market Sentiment remains bullish but volatile, as geopolitical risks continue to underpin prices while keeping markets highly sensitive to any shifts in conflict dynamics.
